CONKERS - An autumnal warning!

PET owners are being warned to stop their dogs from eating killer conkers. The highly poisonous seeds of the horse chestnut tree pose an autumn threat to dogs snuffling around in parks and the countryside.

Poisoned dogs can start displaying some of the horrific symptoms of poisoning within one to six hours of eating the nuts.

"Conkers may be synonymous with autumn, but few people realise that these nuts can pose a serious health risk to your pet if ingested," says The Blue Cross animal welfare charity.

"Although cases are rare, Blue Cross has treated dogs who have fallen very ill after eating conkers. In one recent case, children had been innocently throwing conkers for a dog to catch, unaware of the dangers."

Pet health experts say conkers contain a chemical called aesculin, found in all parts of the horse chestnut tree, including the leaves, and which is toxic to dogs.

"Although fatalities in cases where dogs have consumed conkers are thankfully rare it is still very serious," says the Blue Cross.

"Dogs who have eaten or swallowed conkers, allowing the toxins to enter their body, can be very sick. They can vomit, collapse, have diarrhoea, get very restless with the discomfort and pain, become severely dehydrated and go into toxic shock.

"It has also been reported that dogs can experience respiratory paralysis and can die. Signs of illness usually arise after a couple of days but dogs can show signs of being poisoned within one to six hours of consuming the conkers."

Anyone who suspects their dog may have eaten a conker should contact a vet for immediate advice. A poisoned dog will need



rehydrating and medicating and may, in rare cases, have to undergo surgery to remove any blockages.

The best course of action is stop dogs from eating conkers when they are out on walks.



enthusiasm with us.




The event raised a fantastic £325.00.

CANINE BLOOD DONORS

Did you know that your dog can donate blood in exactly the same way that we do?

Canine blood donations are used to help during surgery, in emergency procedures, during cancer treatments, and a variety of other situations.

There are basic criteria which your dog should meet before they can give blood and these are:

- Aged between 1 and 8 years old
- Weigh more than 15 kg
- Have never previously received a blood transfusion
- Be a healthy dog, not on medication
- Have had their yearly vaccinations and have had regular worming and flea treatment
- Be easy to handle
- Have not previously travelled abroad

Your dog will go through a standard screening process to ensure that each dog is completely comfortable with the process of actual donation of blood.

The blood is taken from a vein in the neck, so this small area is clipped and cleaned and a local anaesthetic cream is applied. The actual donation takes about 6 minutes although the full appointment can take about half an hour.

Blood donated by each dog is split into different component parts in order that each separate part can help several patients.



There are several vets in the local area that do blood donations, Scarborough, Filey and Pickering all have participating vets.

If you have ever had a pet in need of blood then you will realise how vital this service is. The procedure is very simple. After all we humans donate blood on a regular basis, and dogs need this vital component of life just as much as we do and because canine blood donation is less well known than human this very important service is often overlooked.

If you have a dog that qualifies then please contact any one of our local vets for more information, which I am sure they will be delighted to give.

BE AWARE KENNEL COUGH IS IN THE SCARBOROUGH AREA.

This upper respiratory infection is caused by both bacteria and viruses and is spread via coughed up droplets.

Particularly sociable dogs and those sharing an airspace such as in kennels. They DON'T have to be in kennels to get this.

It is highly contagious.

Many dogs will recover without treatment but a vaccination (which goes up their nose) will help prevent it.
