Ticks and other parasites

Although ticks are an old problem they do affect dogs differently these days, there are an increased number of ticks, due to climate change and an increasing deer population, which also host ticks. There is also the issue of ticks that are not endemic to the UK (carrying non endemic diseases) being brought into the country on pets, due to the change in the Pet Passport Scheme which no longer requires people to treat their dog for ticks before bringing them into the country. One of the most recent studies on tick infestation showed that one



in three dogs had ticks. Recent studies also show that ticks, instead of being a spring and autumn problem are now increasingly found to be a year round menace. As our summer holidays are often taken in rural places we need to be aware of the very real risk that ticks present.



Initially you need to be able to recognise a tick, in their early life cycle they look like a sesame seed and hide around the dog's ears and paws. Once they have established on your pet the ticks increase in size and can get to the size of a baked bean and be very firmly attached to your dog. There is then the problem of removing them. To do this you can get a tick hook tool from your Vet. This tool is very easy to use and you can then dispose of the complete tick

safely. If you try to simply pull, cut or burn off the tick the head can be left in the skin of the dog and that can then become infected, and this also increases the risk of disease transmission from the tick to the dog.

Ticks can transmit diseases not only to dogs but also to humans, including Lyme disease which affects the joints and is often extremely debilitating. Another new disease found to be transmitted by ticks to dogs is Babesiosis which can prove to be fatal.

After walking in high risk areas, which include places where there are large populations of either sheep or deer, the Forestry, communal parks areas or areas of long grass or bracken always check your dogs and yourself.

A regular monthly or quarterly treatment, whichever is recommended, is available through your Vet, I myself have found over the counter remedies, though often cheaper are very rarely efficient.

These treatments not only deal with ticks but also with other parasites, such as fleas, round worm and lung worm. Fleas are easiest to spot as they cause excessive scratching which can also affect humans, infestations in the home sometimes take the whole flea life cycle of up to three months to get rid of, once established. Round worm although normally associated with puppies and kittens can affect adult dogs who don't really get ill as a result, but can produce eggs which are then passed out to remain in the soil or sand for a long time, which if



accidentally touched or ingested by humans can cause severe eye and neurological problems.



Lung worm can infest your dog after they have eaten slugs or snails or drunk from muddy puddles which are home to lung worm larvae, or simply chewed grass or played with their toys which may have silver slime trails on them. Lung worm can be fatal to dogs.

However all parasitic infestations can be prevented by regular medication obtainable from your vet who are also able to offer advice.


